COMMUNICATION & LANGUAGE

- Build vocabulary to reflect experiences: body parts, physical actions, family, feelings and favourite things
- Song bag; build a repertoire of traditional songs, rhymes and songs linked to topic, including the Rhyme of the Week
- Use and understand positional language at tidy-up time and during hide and seek games

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

- Explore the different things our bodies can do. Link to chanting number names aloud as children clap, jump, march etc.
- Squiggle: daily scarf dance sessions linked to the development of handwriting patterns (circles, vertical lines, horizontal lines)
- Dough disco: daily dance sessions linked to fine motor development
- Cutting bin snipping toy catalogues and images linked to children's interests
- Take increasing responsibility for own dressing and self-care
- Write dancing discover dominant hands.

PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEV

- Develop an awareness of own feelings, and other people's feelings
- Communicate confidently to friends and about home and community
- Develop self-esteem and pride in achievements, *I can* display
- Getting to know you name games missing picture, rolling ball, Who's that
 in the middle of the circle? Who's got
 the ball? Bumble bee, I see a person...
- Learn Nursery rules and expectations

LITERACY

- Core books: Beckys new teacher,
- Daily story times, encouraging children to listen with increasing attention and recall
- Begin to recognise own name on self register, and other familiar words and logos
- Mark making formats: birthday cards and invitations, telephone messages
- Mark-making books: favourite characters to stimulate drawing and mark making

As people concerned with the environment, we will...begin to take notice of the weather each day, and explore the Forest School garden.
