Overview - What are SAIs in the UK?

- National curriculum tests: This is the official name for the SATs, but the vast majority of people refer to them simply by SATs.
- SATs are standardised assessment tests administered by primary schools in England to children in Year 2 and Year 6 to check their educational progress.
- S.A.T's are used by the government to help gauge the quality of the education at a school.



Overview - What are SAIs in the UK?

The setting and marking of SATs are carried out in UK schools by the Standards & Testing Agency.

SATs are a useful tool to see how well a child has progressed from KS1 to KS2, and they also give secondary schools a base to compare against when the time comes for your child to leave Year 6 and make the journey up to KS3!



Overview - What are Solls in the UK?

Headteachers, Local Authorities and the Department for Education also uses SATs data to identify which primary schools are excelling, and which may be struggling.

Thanks to this information being available, schools that are doing well will share their practice with other schools to improve teaching on a much wider scale.



DATE!

The KS2 SATs run over a one week period.

In 2023, the KS2 SATs will take place between:

Tuesday 9th May to Friday 12th May 2023.

SCIENCE AND WRITING

Children will also be given a formal level of attainment for their writing and science but this <u>will not</u> be via formal tests (like Maths, Spelling and Grammar).

The writing and Science level will be given via teacher assessments. This means that the year six teachers will award pupils their levels of attainment by looking at the work the pupils produce in class in their books.

PREPARATION for



<u>Homework- Please ensure that your child is doing their homework and attending the Booster sessions if they have been invited to them. Your children should be reading everyday and receiving Maths, Reading Comprehension, Spelling and Grammar homework each week.</u>

Good nights sleep - please ensure your child has a good nights sleep so they are energised for the day.

<u>Breakfast</u> – Please ensure that your child has something to eat before they come to school (there is nothing worse than trying to think on an empty stomach).

<u>Punctual – Please ensure your child arrives at school on time.</u> A late arrival might mean your child misses a specific test.

<u>Organised/Equipped-</u> Please make sure that your child comes with what they need for the day. They will still need to bring their reading book and reading record, P.E kit, water bottle, packed lunch and snacks for break time (if that is what they usually do).

Reassurance- Please talk to your child about the importance of these tests (without scaring them) and reassure them that they will do fine if they try their best and apply what they have been taught.

Do not panic!

PREPARATION for CHILDREN



<u>Practice/Homework</u> – Children should be reading for at least 20 minutes everyday. They should be completing the weekly Maths, Reading Comprehension, Grammar and Spelling homework each week and handing it in by Wednesday.

Talk/questions – Children can ask questions and talk to any adult in the school about the S.A.T's if they have any concerns.

Do not panic!

PREPARATION STHOOL



Homework- The year six teachers will set children Homework to reinforce what they have been taught in class and to apply their knowledge.

Boosters – The school will invite children to extra lessons where they specially practise answering S.A.T style questions.

<u>Talk/reassure</u> – As practitioners we will talk and reassure your child about the whole process and answer any questions.

Mock SAT's tests/practice questions – we will run a 'mini' S.A.T's week' so that the children know what to expect.





The Standards and Testing Agency will release the KS2 SATs results to schools in <u>July 2023</u> (first two weeks of July).

They will be sent to your homes and also to the school.

The SATs results obtained will let you know if your child has met (AS) or not met (NS) the expected national standard based on their scaled score.

Your child's secondary school will also receive his/her Year 6 SATs results. In some cases the secondary school will use these results to determine the ability group that your child will be placed in.
